Department of Economic and Community Development

- Grew the revolving loan funds from \$6.25 million in 2018 to \$22 million today
- Disbursed more than \$7 million in low-interest loans that leveraged \$20 million in projects
- Provided city businesses with \$20 million in financing, leveraging \$90 million in investments
- 141 Flagship grants totaling \$346,000, with 19 totaling \$69,000 awarded in 2023



LERTA

(Local Economic Revitalization Tax Assistance program)

- Passed in July 2019
- Spurred investment in 555 projects totaling \$304.6 million
- \$252.8 million for 186 commercial projects
- \$51.8 million for 369 residential projects



CRIZ (Eligible use of funds)

- Property Acquisition
- Demolition, Site Preparation, Infrastructure
- Property Development Soft Costs (Architectural, Engineering, Surveys, Legal Fees)
- New Construction
- Façade Improvements




- \$20.15 million for economic and community development
 - Funding for small businesses and the redevelopment of EMI, Quin-T, Berry Plastics, and Savocchio Opportunity Park
- \$15.1 million for housing
 - To date, more than \$1 million has funded 73 housing rehabilitation projects











- \$12 million for our over 100-year-old decaying stormwater infrastructure.
- \$9.2 million for improvements to parks and public spaces, including:
 - East Bayfront Greenway Trail
 - Former Quin-T site
 - Groundwork Erie
 - Love Your Block grants for small home repair projects.



- \$14.1 million for
 - a public safety complex
 - and to reinstate the Juvenile Unit and Crisis Unit



HUD (federal) and PHARE (state) Funding

- \$3.1 million for businesses, community groups, youth programs, parks
- \$950,000 for housing rehab, first-time homebuyers, affordable rental housing
- \$270,000 for rapid rehousing, emergency shelters, transitional living facilities
- \$100,000 in PHARE Funding for small home repair mini-grants



Permanent Supportive Housing

- \$2.9 million in HOME-ARP funding
- Working closely with Infinite Erie and community partners
- 150 individuals in Erie County who are chronically unhoused and have the deepest service needs



Grants Awarded to the City

- More than \$90 million in grants for exciting initiatives since 2018
- \$15.1 million in grants received in 2023
- An additional \$19.7 million still pending

Love Your Block

- Assisted 52 homeowners with mini-grants for small home repair projects in 2023.
- Projects included façade improvements, paint, removal of 114,000 pounds of junk and debris, landscaping, and installation of handrails, mailboxes, house numbers, and storm doors.
- Saved homeowners \$131,000 in labor costs.










Addressing Blight





East Bayfront Greenway Trail

- Part of East Bayfront Neighborhood Plan
- Collaboration with Redevelopment Authority of the City of Erie, Erie Neighborhood Growth Partnership, and Groundwork Erie
- Replacing blighted properties and vacant lots with public greenspace, Parade to Wayne, 6th to 10th Streets
- Implementation begins Summer 2024

- Local Climate Action Plan





Public Works

- Broke ground on \$7 million Downtown Streetscape Master Plan,
- Began re-development of Miller Brother's Property into a Public Safety Facility
- Implemented Stormwater Fee for improvements to aging infrastructure
- Spent \$10 million on stormwater projects
- Received \$3.12 million DEP grant for 5 heavy-duty EV Refuse Trucks
- Oversaw redesign of Kahkwa Avenue Bridge
- Spent \$4 million on street paving







Public Works Continued

- Worked with PennDOT on West 12th Street signal project
- Started implementation of Active Erie Transportation Plan
- Maintained City's 45 parks/greenspaces, received resident input on park priorities
- Completed installation of Baldwin Park Pickleball Courts \$245,000
- Renovated Martin Luther King Park \$225,000
- Upgraded Lighthouse, Pulaski, Rodger Young, McClelland, and Glenwood Parks
- Established baseball agreements requiring open-play access for residents







Public Works Continued

- Worked with Erie Arts and Culture on public art installations
- Saw record youth participation in Summer Rec program
- Dedicated \$600,000 to remove dead trees, improve lighting, safety, and access
- Offered Electronics and Tire event, serving 700 residents
- Collected 55 tons of glass in partnership with Prism recycling
- Partnered with IRG to place plastic recycling containers in Erie parks
- Received \$2.6 million to maintain streetlights, traffic signals, and crosswalk signs
- Invested in and profitably operated Downing and J. C. Martin Golf Courses.



Erie Police Department

- 59,399 calls for service in 2023 (up from 45,000 in 2020)
- ~1,142 calls/week
- 2023 Crime Trends show decreases in aggravated assaults, persons shot, shots fired, firearms stolen, thefts, forgery, fraud, and criminal mischief.
- Homicides up to 14 compared to 6 in 2022.
- In the last 2 years, detectives solved all homicide cases.



Erie Police Department Continued

- Arrest of 58 drug dealers
- Body Worn Cameras no sustained use-of-force complaints since started October 2022.
- Juvenile Unit diverting youth into programs to put them on a positive path.
- Crisis Unit 162 incidents/month related to domestic, mental, and behavioral health issues.





Erie Police Department Continued


- SWAT team activated 70 times compared to only 39 in 2022.
- PAL more than 1,200 youth and 103 officers committed to building the cop-kid relationship in 19 locations via after-school programs and 4 summer camps.
- Received \$8.1 million in grants to purchase vital equipment, technology, and training; expand PAL; implement crisis teams; and reimburse salaries.



Erie Fire Department

- 8,890 calls for service, up 3,000/year pre-COVID
- 5,068 Emergency Medical Calls
- 490 Motor Vehicle Accidents
- 122 Structure Fires
- 38 Vehicle Fires
- 362 Outside Fires
- 134 HazMat Calls
- Accelerant Detection Canine (Horus) 5 arson arrests







Erie Fire Department


- \$800,000 in grants for fire trucks and equipment
- Made significant improvements to firehouses
- First solar-powered fire station in PA (fifth in the nation)



Project: City of Erie Public Safety Complex

- Space to house admin, equipment, operations critical to the safety of residents, visitors, employees, and business owners; and evidence (some of which must be kept for 99 years)
- Immediate need to move Erie Fire Department admin and fire mechanics division
- Adaptive Reuse of Historic Structure
- Emergency Operations Center
- Central location; Consolidation of services

** On June 15, 2020, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in Bostock v. Clayton County, Georgia that sexual orientation and gender identity discrimination are prohibited under federal sex-based employment protections. Nevertheless, it is imperative that localities continue enacting explicitly LGBTQ+-inclusive comprehensive non-discrimination laws since it will likely take additional litigation for Bostock to be fully applied to all sex-based protections under existing federal civil rights law. Moreover, federal law currently lacks sex-based protections in numerous key areas of life, including public spaces and services. Lastly, there are many invaluable benefits to localizing inclusive protections even when they exist on higher levels of government. For these reasons, the MEI will continue to only award credit in Part I for state, county, or municipal non-discrimination laws that expressly include sexual orientation and gender identity.
